
Townsville LGBTIQ+ COMMUNITIES

The majority of trans healthcare in my area appears to be funnelled through one clinic. This clinic is quite far away and not easily accessible without a car or license, or bus."



"It took a lot of digging and asking around to find the one clinic here I'm told does gender-affirming care. Easy Access should involve widespread knowledge of where to go for such resources, and the fact that there seems to be only one clinic for the entire city that is confirmed safe and inclusive for us in disappointing."

"I've had reasonably good experiences with getting psychological help over the years through organizations like Headspace (early on) and JCU Health (while a student). The 10 free sessions a year for psychology were a lifesaver when going through a particularly bad patch of major depression. I've been able to get bulkbilled Doctor appointments. I think Medicare is a great institution, which is vital to be protected. Culture-wise, there still feels like a reasonable amount of judgement around queer culture and choices within the healthcare system. I also understand that while my experiences have been reasonable, I mostly present as a white male. I have trans and POC friends in the community that have some very difficult experiences. There is also notable difference between older and younger generations of medical practitioners, with the younger being much less judgmental in my experience."

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

"IT WILL TAKE ME AT LEAST 6 MONTHS BEFORE I HAVE ACCESS TO GENDER-AFFIRMING HORMONE THERAPY. THIS IS WORRYING WHEN THINKING ABOUT TEENS WHO ARE EARLY IN PUBERTY AND NEED TIME-SENSITIVE PUBERTY BLOCKERS."

"THERE'S A FEW MEDICAL CENTRES WITHIN DRIVING DISTANCE FROM MY PLACE."

"In my experience, finding gender affirming healthcare was rather difficult. I was only able to find where to go due to another member of my community having access to it. Prior to then, I spent 2 years trying to pursue unaffordable ways that MIGHT have gotten me to my end goal."

"After finding where to start treatment, though, I felt like I wasn't given resources on how to live in my new identity or active support in pursuing it. My endeavour has been rather lonely as I'm the only person in my community who is pursuing a change of gender."

"AS A BISEXUAL WOMAN WHO HAS A MALE PARTNER, MY SEXUAL ORIENTATION DOESN'T IMPACT MY HEALTH CARE CURRENTLY. BUT AS A WOMAN AND A MEDICAL STUDENT, MY ISSUES ARE OFTEN DISMISSED OR MINIMISED. ONLY WHEN I STATE THAT I MYSELF AM STUDYING MEDICINE IS WHEN I GET TAKEN SERIOUSLY BY SADLY MANY HEALTH CARE PROVIDERS."



"Access to Townsville Sexual Health services is present, and I find the Townsville Sexual Health Clinic on Gregory St to be accessible, safe and affirming. However firstly, I have had bad experience with my local GP in Townsville when trying to receive gender affirming care, and when I went to a second GP, they had no knowledge on the matter, but were at least welcoming and willing to learn.."

"I don't feel comfortable in doctors' offices because they make out being trans as something unusual and weird. Also, accessing genderaffirming Healthcare (hormone treatment) has been next to impossible because all you do is get referred to the next place, and all of a sudden, you're in Brisbane every second month to get treatment."





"I don't really face discrimination that much but it could also be because I'm not very open about it. I have gotten a few uncomfortable comments not because of my sexuality but being a girl."

"This has a lot to do with the culture of the city and my own characteristics. I'm ASD, non-binary, polyamorous, and queer, with social anxiety disorder. There are very few circumstances, in any city, that I wouldn't feel on the margins for embodied experience. But this is also a deeply internal experience. Culture shift and education (both myself and community) has made me feel less alienated over time.."

"Transphobic and homophobic language are used openly and unabashedly at work from customers, and sometimes staff members. 50% of my week is spent at work so this is a large dominating facet of my life, and in Townsville, it is

hardly accepting."

"I feel extremely marginalised as there's no support for nonbinary individuals, and there's a lot of hatred for aspect individuals (asexual, aromantic, arosce, demisexual, etc.). The town I live in has many transphobic and homophobic people, and it is very prominent in social media groups for my town."



"It is expensive; housing is hard to get, there are not many mental health services that are affordable, too many social gatherings are alcohol focused, there's not a lot of queer support services, psychologist waiting times are months long, the world is hard to live in these days."

"Tolerable but not accepting. The people I know are kind and mean well. People I don't know are often antagonistic. The attitude towards nonheteronormative people in Townsville is one of disdain and disgust from my POV. There is not many services to access sex health outside of one very good clinic, and your GPs, who may or may not be able to help depending on their experience with queer clientele. There is little government support for trans people to pursue gender reassignment. There is little to do as a queer person who wants to express their identity in terms of social events that aren't just drinking on Flinders St."

"People have very restricted and judgmental views. They are often reluctant to listen or learn about new ideologies or topics that challenge their original ways of thinking. Older people often use their age, and poor excuses to consistently verbalise their negative opinions on sexuality and race."
